

The Mathematics Department at the University of British Columbia is seeking outstanding candidates for a position, subject to funding, at the tenure-track Assistant Professor level, with a starting date of July 1, 2013. Postdoctoral experience is normally expected and a PhD is required. Priority research areas are Number Theory and Representation Theory, specifically p-adic representation theory of p-adic reductive groups.

The successful applicant is expected to work in an area of interest to current faculty, to interact with related groups in the Department and will be expected to teach effectively at the undergraduate and graduate levels and supervise graduate students. The salary will be commensurate with experience and research record.
